Dear Governor Brown:

The Elections Legislative Committee of the California Association of Clerks and Election Officials (CACEO) would like to share concerns relating to **SB 199 (Correa)**, a proposal to require the county elections official, on behalf of vote by mail voters registered in other counties in California, to deliver their out-of-county vote by mail ballots turned in at their county polls to the originating county elections official who issued the ballot.

In a March letter to the author, Senator Correa, the Committee indicated that a number of potential unintended consequences; and, while election officials are aware that a small percentage of voters are not properly returning their ballot to their home county, the following issues were identified:

Timing and Certification:

- ★ it takes days to weeks to go through all precincts' materials to identify and retrieve out-of-county vote by mail ballots. Each precinct's materials must be methodically logged to maintain an audit trail. With the evergrowing number of vote by mail voters and the significant percentage who turn their ballots in at the polls, the time needed to retrieve these out-of-county ballots from election night materials is significant;
- ★ election officials in large counties or those with high percentages of vote by mail ballots are barely meeting the statutory deadline for the completion of the canvass as more and more voters are waiting until the last minute to return their vote by mail ballot. Retrieving vote by mail ballots during the canvass process could require an extension of the official canvass;
- ★ smaller counties often complete their canvass shortly following the election. Would these counties be required to delay the certification of their election(s) and/or re-open the canvass if a ballot was forwarded from another county?

Voter Behavior and Confusion:

- ★ once voters learn that ballots will be forwarded to their home county on their behalf, a significant increase in out-of-county vote by mail ballots can be expected each election. College and University campuses with large numbers of out-of-county students would undoubtedly generate more out-of-county ballots, let alone generate confusion for out-of-state voters who do not share the same benefit;
- ★ The proposal does not specify which election this would apply, and as written, allows a voter to return their vote by mail ballot to any county during any election, regardless if the county they wish to return it is having an election. This may require all election officials to keep their doors open for each election in the state, whether or not their county is conducting an election or not. With five or six established election dates throughout the year, this surely would create confusion for voters and increased workload for election officials who were not currently holding an election in their county.
